DIVISION B – OPEN TO ALL, REGARDLESS OF RESIDENCY

Class

- 18 Roses, cluster flowered - one vase, three cut sprays, one or more varieties
Keyword Challenge Cup for best in Class 18
- 19* Roses, large flowered - one vase, three blooms, one or more varieties
Thornley Cup for best in Class 19
- 20 Roses, rambler or climber – one vase, three cut sprays, one or more varieties
- 21 Roses, scented - one vase, three blooms, one or more varieties
- 22 Pansies – six cut stems, in the container provided
- 23 Marigolds – six cut stems, in the container provided
- 24 Fuchsia - Six cut blooms, one or more varieties, in the container provided
- 25 Gladioli - vase containing one cut stem

- 26 Calendula - vase containing three cut stems
- 27 Antirrhinum - vase containing three cut stems
- 28 Clematis - vase containing three cut blooms of any variety
- 29 Dianthus (eg carnations) – vase containing five cut blooms

- 31 Cabbage – with 7.5cm (3 inches) of stalk
- 32 Lettuce - with roots (Cabbage variety)
- 33 Lettuce - with roots (Cos variety)
- 34 Tomatoes - five, with calyx attached
- 35 Cucumber
- 36 Marrow
- 37 Peas - dish of seven pods
- 38 French Beans, Dwarf or Climbing - dish of seven pods
- 39 Runner Beans - dish of seven pods
- 40 Broad Beans - dish of seven pods
- 41 Carrots - three long pointed with tops cut to 7.5cm/3in
- 42 Carrots - three other than long pointed with tops cut to 7.5cm/3in
- 43 Beet - three with tops cut to 7.5cm/3in
- 44 Shallots - nine
- 45 Shallots (pickling) - nine maximum size 3cm/1¼in diameter
- 46 Onions - three each of which is 250g or under with tops cut to not more than 7.5 cm/3in
- 47 Onions - three each of which is over 250g with tops cut to not more than 7.5cm/3in
- 48 Onion - the heaviest (Novelty Class)
- 49 Garlic – three, with tops cut to not more than 7.5cm/3in
- 50 Radishes - bunch of ten
- 51 Potatoes - dish of five white

- 61 Redcurrants - dish of ten strigs as grown
- 62 Blackcurrants - dish of ten strigs as grown
- 63 Raspberries - dish of ten with stalks
- 64 Loganberries - dish of ten with stalks
- 65 Gooseberries - dish of ten
- 66 Strawberries – dish of ten with stalks
- 67 Soft Fruit - two kinds, one dish of each
- 68 Rhubarb - three sticks - leaf blades should be trimmed back to approx 7.5cm/3in.
- 69 Rhubarb - longest stick of Rhubarb (Novelty Class)

- 70* Patio Pot/Container - planted by entrant, no dimension of pot to exceed 38cm/15in

- 71 Hanging Basket - planted by entrant, diameter up to 38cm/15in

H M F Faure Cup for best in Class 71

- 72 Cut Cottage Flowers - for maximum variety and effect, in a vase

Millennium Cup for best in Class 72

- 73* Annuals – cut collection of two kinds, one kind in each vase

- 74 Perennials – cut collection of two kinds, one kind in each vase

- 75* Hardy Cut Flowers - collection of Herbaceous Perennials and Bulbous Plants (Annuals excluded).

Three kinds, one variety and colour in each vase

Wilkinson Challenge Cup for best in Class 75

- 76 Flowering Tree or Shrub – one vase, three cut stems

- 77 Vase of mixed foliage, minimum three kinds

- 78 Sweet Peas – vase of five stems, one variety

- 79* Sweet Peas – three varieties, five stems of each, one variety in each vase

Queen Elizabeth Coronation Challenge Cup for best in Class 79

- 80* Sweet Peas - vase of nine stems, one or more varieties

D Rossiter Cup for best in Class 80

- 81 Dahlias - one vase, three cut blooms

- 82 Dahlias, pompom - one vase, three cut blooms

- 83 Best Bloom – one cut spike or spray in a vase

Norman Rogers Challenge Cup for best in Class 83

- 84 'One Colour' – two or more varieties of cut flower in a vase (of the same colour eg different shades of blue)

- 85 Dried flowers/seed heads – in a vase

- 86 Pot plant, flowering – pot not to exceed 23cm (9 inches) internal diameter
- 87 Pot plant, foliage – pot not to exceed 23cm (9 inches) internal diameter
- 88 Orchid – in pot, not to exceed 23cm (9 inches) internal diameter
- 89 Begonia - grown from tuber, pot not to exceed 23cm (9 inches) internal diameter at the top
- 90 Plant grown from a cutting (age of plant not to exceed 18 months) - pot not to exceed 38cm (15inches) at the top
- 91 Fuchsia – in pot, not to exceed 23cm (9 inches) internal diameter

- 92 Cactus and/or other Succulent - in two pots

Kiddell Memorial Shield for Best Exhibit in Class 92

Chamber of Commerce Claygate Cup - Highest amount of prize money - Classes 18-92

DIVISION C – OPEN TO NOVICES ONLY

Novice Classes – Open to anyone who has **not yet won a prize** in any of the *Flowers, Vegetables and Fruit Classes* in the Claygate Flower & Village Show

- 119 Courgettes - three, with stalks
- 120 Vegetable in a pot/container - pot not to exceed 38cm (15inches) at the top
- 121 Herb in a pot/container - pot not to exceed 23cm (9 inches) internal diameter
- 122 Garden roses in a vase - three cut sprays, one or more kinds
- 123 Indoor house plant, tended by you for at least three months - pot not to exceed 23cm (9 inches) internal diameter
- 124 A pot/container planted with Annuals using your own seedlings or purchased plug plants - pot not to exceed 38cm/15in at the top
- 125 Peas - dish of seven pods
- 126 Cut Flowers from your garden in a vase, minimum three kinds

Leigh Challenge Cup – Best exhibit in the Judges’ opinion - Classes 119-126, Novice Classes

The Royal Horticultural Society’s BANKSIAN MEDAL will be awarded to the exhibitor who wins the highest amount of prize money in the horticultural Divisions B (Classes 18-92) and D (Classes 127-139). The competitors who won the BANKSIAN MEDAL in 2022 and 2023 are not eligible to win this medal in 2024.

DIVISION D – OPEN TO MEMBERS OF CLAYGATE GARDENING SOCIETY AND CLAYGATE ALLOTMENT HOLDERS ASSOCIATION ONLY

Prize money in Division D donated by these two organisations.

- 127 White Potatoes - dish of five
- 128 Onions, 250g or under, with tops cut to not more than 7.5cm/3in - dish of three
- 129 Beet with tops cut to 7.5cm/3in - dish of three
- 130 Runner Beans – dish of seven pods
- 131 Peas – dish of seven pods
- 132 Collection of three Vegetables, all different kinds, one example of each
- 133 Collection of one vase of one kind of Annuals, one dish of one kind of Soft Fruit and one dish of one kind of Vegetable

Harold Mould Memorial Cup for best in Class 133

- 134 One vase of one kind of Annuals
- 135 Raspberries – dish of ten with stalks
- 136 Lettuces – two with roots (any variety)
- 137 Broad Beans - dish of seven pods
- 138 Carrots – three
- 139 Courgettes, three, 10-20cm/4-8in excluding stalks

Astley Beer Cup - highest amount of prize money - Classes 127-139
